Management Response to Recommendation acceptance status Accepted *If recommendation is partially accepted or rejected, provide reasons:* UNFPA agrees in principle that interagency documents do not replace endorsed internal strategic directives, monitoring frameworks, theories of change and requisite human and financial resources. This is recognized in progress made, for example, through ESARO's 4th transformative result on zero new HIV infections in the context of the current strategic plan and through the HIV detail in EECARO's regional plan. Moving forward, UNFPA's contribution to the HIV response will continue to follow a human rights- and people-centered approach. Ensuring resilience and sustainability of the HIV response require a linked and integrated approach across themes and other UNFPA strategy documents including SRHR as an essential element of UHC, and current tools for programming as well as aligned to the UNAIDS Global Strategy under development. There were 1.7 million new infections in 2019. While substantial decreases were seen in eastern and southern Africa (38% reduction since 2010), infections have increased by 72% in eastern Europe and central Asia, by 22% in the Middle East and North Africa and by 21% in Latin America - HIV remains a public health threat. Globally, 62% of new infections were among key populations and their partners and as high as 99% for regions outside of sub-Saharan Africa As it develops its new Strategic Plan 2022-2025 and associated monitoring frameworks, UNFPA will be working to ensure that HIV, programming, prioritization and targets as part of comprehensive SRHR are appropriately reflected.

Work in this respect is already in process with a push to accelerate. The evaluation notes in its main findings "UNFPA has directed considerable effort towards promoting the rights of the most vulnerable, including adolescent girls and young women (AGYW), other young people at risk and KPs" and there are examples of country programming with a strong human rights foundation over the past decade. UNFPA concurs that support should build on different related HRBA guidelines, including the Human Rights Council Technical Guidance on HRBA to maternal health; and the UNFPA/WHO guide on HRBA to contraceptive service delivery (referenced above). Inclusion of metrics within the next Strategic Plan will also be important (Cross reference action points 1.2 and 1.3).
